

Emblems to be given the World's Champion New York Americans for the victory of 1923 will be Gruen watches of a special design, through contracts awarded the Herschede Jewelry Co., 124 E. 4th St., this city. The award was made to the local firm by the governing powers of baseball and is a signal victory for Cincinnati, as a great many jewelers were in competition for the emblems. The Herschede concern, however, has prepared World Series emblems for the last 15 years, with the single exception of last year. This was due in a measure to the chairmanship of the former National Commission that had been held by August Herrmann. The award was announced Wednesday
